BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS APPOINTS JACKIE PATA AS NEW PRESIDENT & CEO



THRHA's Board of Commissioners announced on April 12th that it had made an appointment for the position of President & CEO. The Board of Commissioners is pleased to announce that Jackie Pata will take the helm at the Housing Authority. A well-respected leader across Alaska and throughout Indian Country, the BOC selected Ms. Pata based on her previous experience in housing and passion for service to Southeast communities, which they feel will be a significant asset to the Housing Authority.

Since 2001, Ms. Pata led the National Congress of American Indians in Washington, DC as its Executive Director. Prior to that, she served as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Native American Programs for the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development w here she w as responsible for the implementation of the Native American Housing Assistance and Self Determination Act. Previously from 1989 to 1998, Ms. Pata w as the Executive Director of THRHA and served as Chairw oman of the Native American Indian Housing Council w here she led the charge to reform the Indian housing program. Preceding her appointment as President & CEO, Ms. Pata also served as Ex-Officio on the BOC for THRHA.

Additionally, Ms. Pata is the Second Vice President for the Central Council of the Tlingit Haida Indian Tribes of Alaska and serves on a variety of national executive boards, including as a Vice President for the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights, Board Member for the George Gustave Heye Center of the National Museum of the American Indian, and she has been a Board Member at Sealaska Corporation since 1999.

INAUGURAL SOUTHEAST HOUSING SUMMIT HOSTED IN JUNEAU

In March, THRHA hosted the First Annual Southeast Housing Summit in Juneau. This event brought together more than 100 participants from Southeast Alaska to explore the theme of "Planning Our Future Through Housing". Conference attendees and presenters represented a variety of housing-related industries that included real estate, local government, mortgage and finance, tribal management, and Alaska Native Corporations.

"Southeast Alaska is presented with a variety of unique housing obstacles," said Joyce Niven, Interim THRHA President & CEO. "High housing costs, low inventory, challenges with building and maintaining new properties are just a few examples of the issues we face in working tow ards sustainable housing in the region."

Over the course of the two-day event, a variety of topics were presented that included: partnerships, community building, planning, and energy efficiency. "We view ed this Summit as a great opportunity for networking and building strong and meaningful partnerships throughout Southeast," said Niven.

APPRENTICES COMPLETE HEAT-PUMP TRANING IN WRANGELL

THRHA is continuing its mission to support energy efficiency and provide career opportunities through technical and field training apprenticeship programs that will help meet maintenance needs in rural Alaska. Recently, the Apprentice Program completed a heat pump training in Wrangell with tw enty-tw o tribal member apprentices from seven different communities.

This hands-on training allow ed for apprentices to install eleven heat pumps in THRHA-ow ned units, replacing oiloperated boilers that w ere at least tw enty years old. "The heat pumps are approximately 130% more energy efficient

than the boilers," said Lorraine DeAsis, Director of Project Development. "Not only will they reduce costs, but they will also reduce maintenance calls and 'no-heat' days for our residents."

This heat pump training w as the third field training and second technical classroom training offered by THRHA. Future projects also include installing hybrid heat pumps and electric hot w ater heaters to completely remove the oil-based systems. "I've been w aiting a long time for this training to be offered," said Yakutat plumbing apprentice, Mike Alfred. "It w as a lot of fun, w e all learned a lot, and through this project w e w ere able to make a difference."

Field trainers were Yakutat tribal citizens Kris Karsunky and Derek James, construction business ow ners in Sitka. In addition to providing the hands-on training, they also helped write a step-by-step installation instruction manual that was distributed to all participants.

THRHA began offering apprenticeship programs in March of 2018. Currently, programs are offered in plumbing and electrical. "We saw that there was a need in our outlying Southeast communities when we were trying to find licensed technicians to do work in those communities. We were also coming across previously completed projects that were not up to code," said Lorraine.

LIHEAP PROVIDES \$530K IN HEATING AID THIS WINTER



THRHA's Low Income Housing Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) had a busy winter season. To date, the team has processed and approved 885 applications and distributed \$530,130 in heating assistance to sixteen communities throughout Southeast Alaska. "We have about 230 applications pending or that have been marked as incomplete as w e are w aiting for clients to return information and documents that are required for us to process the applications," said Tribal Services Program

and processing applications through May 15th so there is still time to apply for anyone w ho needs assistance."

The program, which is federally funded, is available to both Native and non-Native families. It provides a one-time benefit to eligible households to assist with home energy heating costs. The amount of the benefit is determined by household income, household size, fuel type, and geographic location. THRHA AWARDED NEW GRANTS

THRHA is pleased to announce that it w as recently aw arded an Alaska Housing Finance Corporation supplemental grant in the amount of \$646,800. This grant, w hich w as the highest aw arded amount in the State of Alaska, w ill allow THRHA to upgrade heating systems (including boilers and/or heat pumps) for 113 units throughout the 12 communities that THRHA serves. Additionally, THRHA received a \$750,000 grant from the Federal Home Loan Bank (FHLB). This grant is part of the Affordable Housing Program specifically for the Home-ow nership Housing Rehab project. This project targets all 12 THRHA communities and will provide renovation of 30 ow ner-occupied homes at the total cost of \$1.5 million. This grant will allow THRHA to provide rehabilitation to these homes that include safety upgrades, accessibility improvements, increased energy efficiency, and will also help to eliminate environmental hazards.

STUDENT HOUSING VOUCHER PROGRAM

Applications are accepted April 15th-June 15th

THRHA began accepting on April 15th Student Housing Voucher Program applications for the 2019-20 academic year. To be eligible for the program, students must be an enrolled Tribal citizen, meet certain income restrictions, be enrolled as a full-time student at an accredited college, university, or vocational school, and maintain a minimum 2.0 GPA.

"This past academic year, we awarded 42 students with housing assistance," said Megan Gregory, Tribal Services Program Coordinator. "These awards amounted to over \$55,000 in scholarships." Applications are accepted through June 15th of each year and students may qualify for up to \$1,500 per semester or \$3,000 per year with a lifetime maximum of \$12,000 over 8 semesters," said Megan. "We will be accepting applications electronically. We are hopeful that this effort will help streamline check requests and the application process for new and returning students."

Part-time students with a minimum of nine credits per semester may be eligible for 50% of the maximum assistance.
